Quartzsite AZ, January 24 - 26

This is usually our most attended campout as members are able to decide at the last minute to attend. The camp hosts need to know planned arrival and departure and number of people so they can plan accordingly. Our campout hosts included Adrienne & Dan Sherwood & Margie Hoffman who also acted as wagon masters for this outing since we have a vacancy on the board for this position. Our hosts not only handle registrations, do the shopping, prepare a schedule, plus coordinate camp setup/activities. It is a lot of work but can also be very rewarding. Thanks for taking the challenge and a job well done! Did you know there was a shortage of crescent rolls? Shelves were bare and many of us had to visit several stores before locating some packages. Evidently, there are several recipes that RV er's use at this time of the year. Thanks also to Sue and Paul Craft who were close by to provide a helping hand as needed and others that offered up their support.

Ray & Maureen had scoped out our normal location early in the week and were happy that the area was still empty when they arrived on Friday, January 21st. They invited their Big Bear neighbors, Linda & Bob Bulman,

as guests to join our campout. David and Maggie showed up on Friday and they were also the last to leave on 2/1. Dan & Adrienne arrived on Saturday followed by Andy. Luckily Dan had his quad as he was using it to direct our group to the exact location as some had never been to that specific location. Margie pulled in Sunday just in time to be our other camp host. We had 13 rigs and 24 people in attendance. Early arrivals attended the free music jam down La Paz Road on Saturday from 1 to 3 pm at Murphys Music Barn; great entertainment! Meanwhile, the Sherwoods and Gippetti arrived bringing a lite shower to the area. Just what Dan had requested to cut down on the dust. A last minute campfire was provided Sunday night to welcome the early arrivals. Morning announcements were held to a minimum during the scheduled days. Most campers had arrived in time for Monday happy hour where attendees provided light hors d'oeuvre for sharing and later gathered for a campfire. I counted five gas fire pits that we used for nightly gatherings plus a wood fire.

Quartzsite Rock Alignment mostly consists of the word "QUARTZSITE" spelled with rocks across 100 feet of the desert floor designed with an arrow used as a guide for airmen who might have

otherwise been lost in the desert. It's kinda like Andy's lights on his rig that shine so brightly and guide those lost in the dark desert back to their campsite.

At least two mylar balloons drifted off into the sky above Quartzfest. Dan and Jim know more about the process as I believe they both watched the takeoff. I understand they can go up to 30,000 feet with a payload of 58 grams and they are trackable. They have had at least one balloon that has traveled around the world at least three times.

Paul is such a great photographer that he climbed up on Bushes trailer to examine what was required to replace the bathroom air vent to provide more ventilation. Thanks Paul for the photos...now we know that we need to take it to the shop as I'm not allowing Ray to get on the roof, especially since he has occasional bouts with vertigo. Little did I know that Paul does not like heights...sorry but thank you!

We have our own drone group between Crafts, Gippetti and Koski plus Miller that wasn't in attendance. Let's see who is the next to add to this already existing fleet?? The boys had plenty of good air time for flying their drones. Andy went offsite to enhance his drone flying capabilities as can be seen by his video of Quartzsite. It sure is nice to have multiple people in our group that love to take photos and fly so they can be shared with those that are not in attendance. I noticed Linda Koski and Sue Craft sharing info as they discovered they both had identical cameras. I hear they are both looking forward to capturing some great photos, especially birds, during the May campout. Can't forget all the men in the group that are taking pictures and forwarding them to Lindsay to add to the website.

Tuesday was set aside as a **Go To Town Day** and everyone gathered in the afternoon for a chapter meeting followed by Wahdingers. We only had two fire pits so a third rock pit was used to cook the wahdingers. We didn't have our usual stick stand but had plenty of sticks available and Queen Barbara was able and willing to start the crescent rolling process. Peter jumped in and started assisting Barbara while some tried to load their sticks with or without much success. Remember to place one piece over the top of the dowel then the second piece below. Roll n' roll between your hands to ensure there are no visible bubbles, seams or openings in the dough. There were several lessons learned that night. PAM cooking spray is the preferred choice. Spray the dowel only once at the beginning and gently wipe off excess oil as we fed a few crescents to the coals. Used sticks must cool before using again. Kingsburg charcoal provides a nice hot fire; others work but seems to take a lot longer.

A few of our group attempted to join in on the zoom campfire but as the night went on it worked better to just do a phone call. Later in the week Dan and Ray joined in on the Good Sams Ham radio net.

Breakfast was Wednesday morning at 8 a.m. where the club provided scrambled eggs, coffee, juices and the members brought their contributions to share. Remember that as most of us come from California that you add an hour when in Arizona. My suggestion is to move breakfast a little later as it was still dark when getting up to prepare the food. Margie had hot coffee available; Sue and Jane were cracking and scrambling eggs. Ray was using his outside blackstone grill and stovetop to heat up potatoes and bacon while Maureen was inside preparing fresh waffles. Austa had already prepared some homemade muffins and I noticed other tasty breads, cookies and fruits. Everyone checked to see what they had in their rigs to contribute to happy hours and breakfast and no one went away hungry. I did notice someone who had a full plate of goodies one evening that bit the dust....don't worry as more was just a few steps away.

Wednesday was the Quartzfest 4x4 tour which was attended by Griffiths and Jim Koski. They did have to lower their tire pressure as one area was soft sand. There is a wall of gum related products and articles from around the world, i.e., Italy, Germany, Turkey, China, Rome, Bangkok plus others. Dan has an item at home that he couldn't find in the gallery and is considering donating it. Do you remember when you would take a gum wrapper and fold it to make a chain? A barber shop was at Main/95 housed in the back of an open toy hauler. Unleaded gas had risen to \$3.49 -\$3.69 a gallon; diesel was \$3.89 - \$4.31 Don't worry as Dorothy & Toto's Ice Cream/Kettle Corn was still there to satisfy our sweet tooth. The big tent was the same and we arrived at 9:15 a.m. parked by the tent and were in and out within an hour or so. We wore our masks as some chose not to but you could walk freely without bumping into people. The dip booth was there selling their products as normal. Overall number of dry campers appeared to be lower and some full hookup rv parks had vacancies. Food prices were higher as I especially noticed a gallon of milk for \$4.40. at the Dollar Store and some shelves for particular items were empty. Cost to dump sewer on Hwy 95 in town was \$10. and water was \$6. and I understand you use their hoses.

584 individuals signed into Quartzfest; lower than they anticipated. Dan & Adrienne supported the event by doing testing plus attending talks on metal detecting plus others subjects. Unfortunately, on Friday, one woman awoke only to find that her husband had passed during the night; at least he was enjoying what he loved. We joined FMCA (Family Motor Coach Association) at the big white tent as this group also provides means to help you should you ever experience similar circumstances, especially while traveling with your rigs. In fact, if you have any questions feel free to contact Don Schleuse, member of our group, who is the National Vice President Northwest Area. But don't wait too long as his term will be expiring in the near future. I know two in our group that have signed up this year. My theory is "If you have safety measures in place maybe you won't have to use it for not-so-good incidents."

Most of our group pulled out Thursday. Those that remained had an opportunity to attend some of the Quartzfest planned seminars/activities. A special treat was when Rod & Marianne Bunn stopped to visit the Bushes and Rod brought his two guitars. Rod invited the gal that wrote the HAM song a few years ago to join us with her husband who played the harmonica. After a short visit everyone pulled out their musical instruments: Margie brought her guitar, Adrienne added her recorder (flute), David setup his electronic drums aided by Rays' generator and Rods' Bose amplifier, also added was a tambourine and indian drum. We had our own jam session in the middle of the desert. I learned something new....David used to play drums in a rock band! Next time we hope to have some copies of the songs so we can all contribute with our voices and just maybe this can be added into our campout planned schedule.

Great time by all and I believe we had the best weather since we've been attending. HAPPY CAMPING!
